

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
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Welcome to the 68th Annual Pennsylvania Relief Sale!

We are thrilled to be together again for the Pennsylvania Relief Sale! It is with joy that we carry on the tradition that began on a Berks County farm by the Zion Mennonite Church congregation in 1957. With more than six decades of annual activities, the Pennsylvania Relief Sale has grown and flourished

into a vibrant, non-profit organization committed to fundraising on behalf of Mennonite Central Committee (MCC). Last year in 2023, the Pennsylvania Relief Sale donated nearly \$400,000 to MCC.

MCC continues to address worldwide issues by supporting projects and initiatives in relief, development, and peacebuilding. Funds raised this year through My Coins Count will be focused on water. Thank you, **Darrell and Lisa Mast**, for continuing to give leadership to My Coins Count and to **Rudi Niessen** for overseeing the counting operation. The free will offering on Friday night during the performance of the Weaverland Mennonite Conference Youth Choir will benefit MCC's response to the conflict in Palestine and Israel. During the Quilt Auction and Country Auction, there will be opportunities to purchase Blessing Bids to support water projects in Bolivia.

I continue to give thanks for all the participants who attend this two-day sale. Your generosity does not go unnoticed as you help us raise funds for MCC. No matter how familiar you are with the mission or work of MCC, we welcome you to participate and learn more.

An event like this requires lots of volunteers—thanks to all for your willingness to serve. I am especially grateful for the contributions of **Lloyd and Jane Martin**. Lloyd has directed the sale layout, set up, and tear down since 2009 along with serving on the Board. Jane has been the administrative assistant for the sale since 2008. Their service will be missed but we are pleased to have found folks to continue their good work: **Dave Hudson** for sale layout and **Meg Martin** as administrative assistant.

The Board of Directors is a great group of volunteers whose enthusiasm makes it a joy to fulfill the PRS mission. **Cloyd and Dorcas Martin** with their many volunteers oversee all the food stands which bring in nearly \$100,000 annually. While we won't be offering strawberry pies this year due to lack of a coordinator, we will offer several new food items.

Service Animals Policy


The Pennsylvania Relief Sale does not permit animals in any venue where sale or sale-related activities are conducted. There are two exceptions:

Sustainability at the Sale

The Pennsylvania Relief Sale Board of Directors is conscious of the environment and embraces sustainability initiatives. You may notice that the PA Farm Show Complex does not separate trash from recyclable plastics and paper. They commingle these items which are taken to the Susquehanna Resource Management Complex, home to the country's first waste-to-energy facility. They offer an environmentally safe and sustainable option for disposing of waste while also generating clean, renewable energy. The volume of waste is reduced by 90% and greenhouse gas emissions are reduced by combusting the waste instead of filling landfills. They also recover ferrous materials for recycling.

The Board is pleased with this initiative and supports this environmentally sensitive practice which (we believe) aligns with Christian stewardship.

What the Gift of Clean Water Brings

New wells built with the support of MCC and Congolese Mennonite Brethren save time and improve health

The path that teenage sisters Léonie and Channele Kingenzi used to navigate to bring water home from the Kanzombi spring is steep and uneven. Their flip-flops searched for footholds among the rocks and roots of the leaf-covered path as they each balanced a full, six-gallon, yellow container of water on their heads.

On a good morning, they would return in one hour from the spring to their home in Kanzombi, an area on the outskirts of the city of Kikwit in Kwilu Province in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DR Congo). The water would be enough for their mother to cook and for them and their three younger siblings to bathe before school started.

On bad mornings at the spring, fights erupted between youth who wanted water first—delaying the line, preventing the sisters from getting water for three or four hours and making them late for school. As newcomers to the area in 2017, they were sometimes beaten, and once they came home with no water, says their mother, Germaine Kambundi.

All this for water that made people sick anyway.

The spring water is contaminated by waste matter that leaches into the water supply from the soil above the spring, says Dr. Jacques Tangudiki, who treats people





at the hospital in Kanzombi. It causes stomach pain and diarrhea, sometimes typhoid and, at worst, cholera, which can be deadly in 24 hours if not treated.

But people had little choice. The only potable water in this area for years was from government-operated wells that are too expensive for those who subsist on what they can grow and sell.

The lack of clean water is a long-time misery. But the problems – from the need to the tensions at springs and the illnesses – exploded as some 15,000 people fled into Kikwit in 2017.

Survivors of brutal fighting in the Kasai region, they came with burns, wounds from machetes and babies about to be born. They were exhausted from walking for weeks or months from various regions of neighboring Kasai Province without much food or water. They carried emotional wounds from watching their family members and neighbors massacred in front of them.

The Communauté des Eglises de Frères Mennonites au Congo (CEFMC; Community of Mennonite Brethren Churches in Congo), which is based in Kikwit, saw their need.

Individuals responded by taking people into their homes and giving clothing and food. The CEFMC hospital staff provided medical care, and Mennonite Brethren churches became temporary shelters.

Over time, CEFMC built up a broad support system for the displaced people in the community and the host families sheltering them – including providing support for education, primary health care and fields for farming.

Having clean water is a key component of this effort.

With MCC's support, CEFMC drilled a well in Kanzombi in October 2021, a second one in another part of Kikwit in 2022 and another in a third location this past summer.

Even before the third well was completed, the results were dramatic.

"We went from 38% to 9% of waterborne diseases," says Tangudiki, who coordinates primary health care for displaced people on behalf of CEFMC.

The wells are between 120-130 meters (or about 400 feet) deep. Two or three times a day, water is pumped from each well to fill an elevated water tank. The first tank built holds 2,000 liters (528 gallons) of water, while the second and third hold 3,000 liters (almost 800 gallons). Water flows by gravity from the tanks to two water taps where people come to fill their water containers.

QUILT CARE

Quilts today are generally made of washable fabric and batting. However, these three layers are held together with stitches of fine thread. **Proceed with care when cleaning to insure its longevity. Options include vacuuming, professional cleaning, or wet wash.**

If the quilt must be washed, use lukewarm water and a small amount of mild detergent or wool wash, preferably in a bathtub. Avoid spinning, tumbling,

or wringing of the quilt when removing excess water. The least amount of stress to the quilt and its stitches is to dry it in a horizontal position, flat on the lawn, on a sheet or other absorbent material, and out of direct sunlight. Machine drying is not advised; but if so, use the delicate setting at a low temperature. Old or vintage quilts require professional cleaning. Dry cleaning is not recommended.

When not in use, store the quilt in a cloth wrapping such as a pillowcase or sheet. Never leave a quilt in a plastic bag or tote, cardboard box, wooden chest, or directly on a wooden shelf. Rolling is best for a quilt. Another option is to fold the quilt on the bias. Folding fibers at an angle causes less crimping than folding them back on

themselves. This can preserve the integrity of both the batting fibers and the threads in the fabric. Refold the quilt occasionally to avoid permanent crease lines and fabric tensions. Examine the quilt periodically for insect damage.

REGARDING QUILT SIZES

Consider the following when deciding the size of a quilt to buy:

- · Mattress size (newer mattresses are deeper)
- The amount of drop desired
- · The desired amount of pillow tuck

The following chart may help you decide what size you want:

SINGLE	39"	75"	74"	108"
DOUBLE	54"	75"	90"	108"

All items up for sale at the Quilt Auction are on display in the Quilt Display Area.





Giving Babies a Fair Shot

A vaccination clinic and MCC infant care kits help families defy odds in South Sudan.

At the Mary Ward Primary Health Care Centre outside Rumbek, South Sudan, the piercing sound of a choir of nearly 100 crying infants is not cause for alarm. Rather, the wailing signals something amazing. Every Tuesday, local children arrive at a large tent outside the building to receive their vaccines.

The weekly vaccination clinic serves between 80 and 100 infants. Most are on a five-month regimen of immunizations recommended by the World Health Organization, including polio, tetanus, hepatitis B, whooping cough, tuberculosis, diphtheria and rotavirus.

The clinic provides around 3,000 infant immunizations each year and serves an area of the Lakes State in South Sudan that encompasses around 24,000 people.

One out of every 10 children born in South Sudan does not survive to see their 5th birthday. This heartbreaking statistic is caused by many factors, but access to health care for new mothers is a major one. Widespread poverty means health care is inaccessible to many women, leaving South Sudan with some of the highest maternal, infant and child mortality rates in the world.

To help local children beat these odds and meet other community needs, the Mary Ward Primary Health Care Centre opened in 2020 on the grounds of MCC partner Loreto Rumbek School. Loreto provides primary school for boys and girls up to grade eight and operates a secondary boarding school for girls.

In addition to vaccines,
Mary Ward offers a fully
stocked pharmacy,
examination rooms, a recovery
unit of hospital beds and a
school counselor who can
address questions about
mental health or puberty.

When the vaccination

clinic began, staff were aware that community members had limited access to information about immunizations. As a result, many families were unsure if the benefits of vaccines outweighed the risk of negative side effects. The





clinic has raised awareness about the effectiveness of vaccines.

They also began offering MCC infant care kits to mothers whose children finished the whole program of vaccinations through 9 months of age.

And it worked.

The kits provide valuable amenities for newborns, including sleepers, onesies, a blanket, safety pins, soap, socks and a cap. Even if all these items were available at local markets, which is unlikely, just one or two of them could cost as much as 3,000 South Sudanese pounds, which is around \$3 or about a month's wages for many jobs at the state level.

Mary Atheen, who was receiving an infant care kit after her 9-month-old daughter Rebecca Yar got her last vaccine, says the kit was a huge incentive. But she's also seen the difference that vaccines have made.

"Before, I didn't know it was such an important thing concerning the health of the child," says Atheen. "I brought my first child here as a trial to see if it would be healthy compared to other children and she was always healthy. I have seen other children with the measles or polio and my children have not had these. I'm very grateful."

Bringing Hope in Gaza

Cash transfers in Gaza provide essential lifeline for basic needs

Nestled on a high shelf between stacks of books in Nader Abuamsha's office, there's a small sign that reads, "Hope is the only thing stronger than fear." In other times and places, this sign could read as a simple platitude. But over the last few months, Abuamsha's capacity for hope (and fear) has certainly been tested.

Though he's based in Jerusalem at the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees (DSPR), Abuamsha is working to provide cash transfers to vulnerable people in Gaza through a project funded by Mennonite Central Committee (MCC). As the central office of long-time MCC partner Near East Council of Churches (NECC), DSPR has been supporting Palestinian refugees since shortly after the Nakba — the violent displacement of hundreds of thousands of Palestinians during the War of 1948 and formation of the State of Israel.

Since the October 2023 attacks by Hamas and the significant response from the Israeli military, more than 26,000 Palestinians have been killed and around 90% of the total population has been forcibly displaced. Abuamsha says because so many people fled under rocket and artillery fire, many have little more than the clothes on their back.

"The conditions that people are living under are horrible," he says. "Most of the people are living under plastic sheets. It can't protect them from rain, the cold and wind."

Attempts to send emergency relief, food and medical supplies into Gaza have been heavily restricted by Israeli military forces. As a result, finding food, even basics like flour, salt and oil, has become nearly impossible for most Palestinians in Gaza. For the food that is left, prices have skyrocketed.

"One kilogram of salt used to be two shekels, around half a U.S. dollar. Now, if you can find it, you won't pay less than \$8 [USD]. You don't talk about meat and eggs — it's not there," says Abuamsha.

Using a secure payment method through an app called PalPay (not to be confused with PayPal), NECC/DSPR staff on the ground connect with refugees whose needs could be addressed, at least in part, with a cash transfer. Once accepted, the recipients can take the money out as cash or as in-kind goods at the stores, pharmacies or suppliers that are still operational. Despite the immense strain on supplies in Gaza, there are some items that can be obtained by those who have the money.

"One woman spoke to our social worker, asking about getting menstrual pads," says Abuamsha. "She said to our social worker, 'I'm living in a small



classroom with 22 people, living with my family and my neighbors.' She should go and be able to find those with dignity.

"What is the most beneficial for someone?" he asks. "They know better than us. They know their pain, their needs."

The conditions in Gaza are incredibly dire. Hundreds of thousands of refugees are competing for a mouthful of food; some have resorted to drinking water from unsafe sources, like toilets or the sea, all while Israeli military strikes continue to destroy their homes and kill their neighbors, including three NECC staff who were killed while carrying out their work.

Referencing the sign behind him, Abuamsha acknowledges both the grim reality of the threat of genocide in Gaza and the nature of hope in times that feel hopeless.

"It's not easy to continue life with such a situation. There are limited alternatives in front of us. If you don't keep hope alive, you will die. But the mission of goodness, the mission of serving God, the mission of reducing pain and suffering of others — this mission makes it a bit less difficult for you to continue.

"We see good brothers and sisters around us. We see the solidarity of the world with us. We see some organizations like MCC, supporting and caring about what we are doing. ... This is really encouraging and bringing hope for us that life will be different, life will be better."

Displaced by War in Ukraine

A horse lover uses her expertise to help traumatized children strengthen their bodies and spirit.

Before the Russian military invasion began, our Mennonite Brethren church in eastern Ukraine had special meetings to prepare us for evacuation. When the invasion happened, we had our luggage completely packed. There were 21 of us who would travel together.

We couldn't believe that the war started for real. Almost every day we were looking for where to go and stop and stay. There was a huge stream of people who were evacuating and needed a place to stay too.

Sometimes it was very sad for our team, and we just sat down and cried and cried. And other times we just laughed because emotions were too much.

We started to pray to God to show us one building in western Ukraine, one house where we could be together. One of our leaders got a call from his friend, who knew a friend in the United States who had friends in Zakarpattia, who had a house. They let us stay there.

When we came in February 2022, we realized it was not comfortable or



fancy. It was hard to accept the reality that the toilet was outside, and there was no heat on the second floor. But anyway, we were all together for eight months.

Then my mother, sister and I moved into our own place. It took me half a year to recover a little bit. I think all those constant moves made me feel weak. In the church I started to attend there, I could not sing. My body and soul needed to refresh.

During this time, we started to deliver MCC-supported food packages to other displaced families through the Association of Mennonite Brethren Churches of Ukraine. We started to talk to those families, and I could understand that my pain is not so big or so much as in some other people.

God helped me to understand deeply that there is some kind of mission, even in these circumstances. I have a bachelor's degree in physical rehabilitation and a master's degree in ergotherapy. I started to have a very huge desire to open some kind of ministry belonging to my profession and to help people refresh.



I always liked horses. I sat on a horse for the first time when I was 12 years old. It was an ordinary walk at a leisurely pace on horseback, but at one point the rhythm of the steps increased, and the horse trotted several paces. Those emotions of joy and flight cannot be described in words.

About that time, I had started to visit church and had given my life to Christ. I realized that a horse is not just an animal. Horses can help restore strength, restore emotions. Interaction with God's creation can help, can give a whole lot of positive emotions.

In 2022, as I started to think deeply about what my ministry would be in western Ukraine, I knew that riding therapy, connected with massage, could bring big changes for the physical body.

So, I drove around looking for stables. At the first stable I found, I took more lessons and learned how to care for the horses. Special teachers showed me how to put the children on the horses and other details I needed to know to combine my skills in physical therapy with horseback riding.

In October 2022, I went to shelters where the supervisors gave me a list of children who needed rehabilitation, and I talked with their parents. I paid to give lessons using the stable's horses with money I made giving massages to people who had problems with their backs. Some of my friends who knew what I was doing donated money to help. MCC began to support the project in February 2023.

Many children in Zakarpattia hide in their hearts deep suffering, including pain, fear, loneliness and rejection. Each rehabilitation session aims to restore the child's emotional, physical and psychological health for positive personal formation as a young peacemaker.

When a child is in the saddle, it inspires and helps a child to concentrate no longer on one's own experience, but on new and potential achievements and opportunities. All the front and back movements of the horse send impulses to the brain and then to the whole body to refresh all the muscles.

Conversation is open for the children. They can tell us what they are feeling. Very often, children talk about what they had to leave because of the war and relocation. They talk about a pet that died. Most children miss dad because men tend to live elsewhere to earn money or protect property. They talk about everything terrible that they saw.

In the future, I have a big dream about making my own rehabilitation center, where other types of rehabilitation could be used, and other kinds of clients could be served.
